



## Pupil Premium Outcomes 2015-2016

The 'Pupil Premium' is additional funding given to publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and diminish the difference between children receiving pupil premium and their peers.

The three categories of children that qualify for pupil premium are children who are entitled to free school meals (FSM); those children looked after by the local authority (CLA); children with parents in the armed forces. The government has stated that it is for schools to decide how the pupil premium is spent although schools are required to give an outline of how the money is allocated and how it will benefit those specific groups of children in particular.

The amount received for pupil premium in 2015-2016 was £32, 130.

The following is how the money was spent and the impact of the outcomes.

£3000	Outdoor Play and Learn Project to be started with an Outdoor Play Advisor offering support to school. £1200	Targeted support from the Behaviour Support Team to address self esteem, social skills and behaviour.	To improve the self esteem and social skills of children entitled to Pupil Premium and provide focussed intervention from a specialist agency.	Feedback from the children has been very positive. Evaluation showed that all children enjoyed the group and some reported that it helped them to feel valued and happier.
£2000	Parent Support Advisor	Disadvantaged families will receive support and advice from the Parent Support Advisor and be able to access a wide range of agencies.	The involvement of our Parent Support Advisor with some children entitled to pupil premium has been very positive and ensured that school is engaging well with these children and their families.
