

Autumn Term Home Learning Project

During the Autumn term we are going to be learning about Ourselves and our senses, as well as Traditional Stories. For your home learning, I have outlined a range of tasks and activities for you to complete so that you can still learn about them at home.

<p>Use some paint to make handprints of everyone's hands in your family and then cut out the handprints. Can you put them in order of size from the smallest handprint to the largest handprint? If you haven't got any paint, you could draw around hands instead!</p>	<p>Sit quietly and listen carefully to see what you can hear. Draw pictures of some of the things you could hear in your house or garden.</p>	<p>Can you make a noisy musical shaker? Put some small items such a pasta, rice or beads into a plastic container with a lid. Shake it. What does it sound like? Swap the items and compare the different sounds? Which one makes the loudest sound?</p>
<p>What is your favourite food? Can you try some new foods that you haven't tried before?</p> <p>Can you make a paper plate of healthy food by using play dough, coloured paper etc to make the shapes of a range of food. You could draw and colour the food if you prefer.</p>	<p>Make paper puppets of a fairy tale and cut them out. Stick them onto lolly sticks or even pencils and put on a puppet show. Can you draw yourself as a fairy tale character?</p> <p>Go for a walk or into your garden/woods to collect natural materials. Use them to create a fairy tale woodland.</p>	<p>Ask a grown up to tell you or read the story of the Three Little Pigs. Can you retell the story using different animals like penguins or sharks? Which animal would you have instead of a wolf? Can you draw a story map to show what happens in the story?</p>
<p>What materials did the Three Little Pigs use to build their houses? Can you design your own house for the pigs?</p> <p>Build with blocks or anything you like! Take some photographs of your designs.</p>	<p>In The Three Bears story baby bear loves to cuddle up to his teddy in bed. Do you have a favourite teddy bear? Can you draw or paint a picture of them? Can you try and write their name?</p>	<p>In the story Jack and The Beanstalk, Jack climbed up a very tall beanstalk. Can you create a tall magical beanstalk? You could use blocks, lego, junk materials or anything you can find in your home. How tall can you make your beanstalk? What do you wish you could find at the top of your beanstalk?</p>
